

TRANSFER ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND LIFE SCIENCES

Students in the Agricultural Technology Program who want to transfer to a bachelor's degree program in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences must submit the following documents to the Virginia Tech Office of Undergraduate Admissions, 201 Burruss Hall by February 15th:

1. Completed on-line transfer application with the appropriate application fee. Please make sure the box is checked that the student is applying under the Agricultural Technology Articulation Agreement.
 2. An official high school transcript
 3. Official transcripts from all previously attended colleges or universities
 4. Transcript from Agricultural Technology
- (All transcripts can be forwarded from the Agricultural Technology Office.)

ADMISSION CRITERIA

The student **must** have completed the Associate's degree in Agricultural Technology with an overall Virginia Tech GPA of 3.0 or better.

The student's high school transcript must show completion of Virginia Tech's minimum course requirements for admission to four-year degree programs. This must include 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics to include Algebra 1, Algebra 2 and Geometry, and at least 2 units of a lab science which must be selected from biology, chemistry or physics. Three units are recommended for all science-related majors.

If the student had previous college work at another institution, then a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 or better is required as determined by the Undergraduate Admissions Office.

Applicants not meeting this above criteria will be encouraged to attend a community college for one year to complete core requirements in English, math, and science as appropriate for the intended major and earn a competitive cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better.

The department in which the student is admitted will evaluate the academic transcript(s) to determine what credit may be transferred. Admission may not be granted to restricted majors.
